
# The New Evangelization

Soon after the pioneer priests established parishes in the area, they formed schools, first taught by themselves and soon afterwards by religious sisters. For generations each parish had its own school, but as time went on, consolidation was necessary. Of course the most recent consolidation was in 2005 when Aquinas and Marquette combined to form Holy Trinity.

Needless to say, over the many years, our Catholic schools have had to change with the times. Initially catechism classes were taught in German, the language of an immigrant people. Today classes are taught with "smart boards" and iPads and without a doubt, many more technological changes will come in the future.

Our Catholic schools have had to adapt to the times. One of the biggest challenges that had to be faced a generation or two ago was the lack of religious sisters to teach in our schools. For well over 100 years their hard work and sacrifices, along with their powerful example of faith, made our area Catholic schools premier institutions of learning and the envy of the wider community. At

one time, almost all of our teachers were women religious, but now we don't have a single sister working in our school. But Catholic education continues through the hard work and sacrifices of many faith-filled lay teachers who are so committed to the mission of Holy Trinity.



To meet the evolving needs of our students and to continue the mission of our Church, which is to make disciples, our schools have had to change with the times. Change is seldom easy, but change is necessary if *(continued next page)*

Today the biggest challenge that faces the Church and consequently our Catholic school is secularism. Secularism questions the very meaning of human life and sees religion (any religion) as being absolutely irrelevant to modern man. Regretfully our Catholic families are not immune to this influence, as witnessed by the fact that nationally only about 30% of Catholics attend Mass on any given Sunday.

To counteract this pervasive attitude of indifference, the Church, starting with Blessed John Paul II, has been calling the faithful to the *New Evangelization*, which is a call to young and old alike to rediscover the depth and beauty of their Catholic faith, and to allow this renewed faith to deepen their love and commitment to Jesus.

This is the challenge of our Church, this is the challenge of our parish, this is the challenge of our Catholic school to bring people to Christ and to help them truly become His

disciples. But we need to remember that what has worked in the past, won't necessarily work today. New challenges often call for new strategies.

To be successful, this *New Evangelization* must take root not only in our parishes, but also in our school and in our families. How this will be done is still unclear, but one thing is for sure, our parishes, our school, and our families must work closely together to meet the challenge of our age. There is nothing more important than passing on the faith. To do this we need each other. Let us pray for Holy Trinity School, and for the parishes of North Lee County, that together we might take the Church's call for the *New Evangelization* seriously and that we might help the people that we serve to become true disciples of Jesus. **HTC**

# A SUMMER DAY TO REMEMBER

If you happened to be up and outside in Fort Madison around 5am on Wednesday morning July 24, 2013, what a sight there was to behold. On the corner of 26th Street and Avenue A, 15 Ready Mix trucks with drivers from all parts of Southeast Iowa waited their turn in line to deliver the first of many loads of concrete for the new HTC Jr./Sr. High parking lot.

With the goal of pouring roughly 600 cubic yards of concrete, more than 30 men showed up bright and early with their equipment and got right to work forming, grading and pouring the largest section of the lot.

Various members of the HTC School and Foundation Boards, alumni and parish volunteers, as well as crews working for JDM, Coffey Construction, Matt Mohrfeld, Abolt Construction, and Mohrfeld Electric worked side-by-side. With the addition of much-needed equipment from Pieper Excavation and Meller Excavation and Asphalt, it wasn't long before definite progress was being made.

On a day that would be categorized as “perfect weather” for pouring concrete, passers-by marveled in amazement to see all of the men from these competing businesses coming together smiling and laughing, each pitching in wherever needed to get things done smoothly.

Dennis and Kate Menke, along with Deina Merschbrock of Sonny's Grocery in West Point, provided lunch and drinks for the group while throughout the day various alumni and parish volunteers brought homemade treats for

encouragement and support.

Around 2pm, Jake Denning from JDM called out to their other construction sites and sent for an additional crew of men to help us finish. Drivers from Ideal and Shipley Ready Mix kept delivering to us for close to 14 hours straight, bringing a total of over 1,000 cubic yards of concrete. Everyone worked late into the night until we had to start shining vehicle headlights on to the cement in order for them to finish.

**A**s part of the Holy Trinity Catholic Schools Century Strong Capital Campaign, rather than just writing a check, a number of people expressed interest in donating labor, materials, and know-how to the Capital Improvement/Renovations projects. So after a number of planning meetings with contractors and volunteers, on June 15, 2013, we officially started the demolition work to tear out the old concrete/asphalt at the Jr./Sr. High School.

With a number of improvements in mind, the new entrance was designed by Jason Harder of Bruner, Cooper & Zuck to make more efficient drop off and pick up access for buses. An additional lot for Faculty and Visitors was created to accommodate parents before and after school.

By widening the lot and optimizing parking spaces, we were able to add parking while improving the flow of traffic. All of the old gravel area was replaced with concrete and new lighting was installed for the entire perimeter of the lot to improve driver and pedestrian safety.

Our pool of local contractors included Craig Abolt, Gary Coffey, Jake Denning, Miles Wellman, Matt Mohrfeld, Doug Walljasper, Zach Pieper, and Mike Mohrfeld. They all volunteered labor, equipment, and crews to complete the demolition, grading, lighting and concrete work. Both Shipley and Ideal Ready Mix, and Cessford Construction supplied concrete and rock at a 50% discount. Jet Gas and Hunold Oil both donated gallons of fuel for the projects machinery usage.



# HTC Jr./Sr. High Students Receive iPads

**T**uesday, September 17th was an exciting day for students at the Jr./Sr. High as every student in grades 7-12 received an iPad to be used at home and at school. The elementary students received iPads last year and the teachers and students have all benefited from the implementation of that technology into the classroom. It is sure to be the same at the Jr./Sr. High as both faculty and students get used to their devices and determine the best way to make use of them in the classroom. The teachers at the Jr./Sr. High were given iPads several months ago and have been “practicing” to see how this new equipment can benefit them in their classrooms.

In order to prepare for the iPads, HTC spent last year building the infrastructure of the school to increase bandwidth and to add additional access points. These updates ensure that the internet is fast and reliable regardless of how many people are using their iPads at the same time. The school also purchased the Child Internet Protection Association filter which will help faculty monitor the way students are using their iPads.

Chuck Elbert, Holy Trinity CAO, wants everyone to understand that the iPads aren't meant to replace teachers in the

classroom. “It’s a tool, but it’s not the only tool. We’ve had great teachers educating kids before iPads came, and we still have great teachers. The iPads will allow more complex communication. It allows for more self-directed learning.”

After only one week, it is evident that the iPads are quite a success as kids can be found busily working with their iPads in the classroom, in the hallways and during lunch. They are clearly enjoying the new technology just as the teachers are enjoying exploring their options in how best to use iPads to enhance learning in the classroom.

Using funds that have been raised by the ongoing Capital Campaign, as well as bequests left from HTC supporters, the school was able to purchase the iPads. 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# HTC Junior Travels to Thailand for Volleyball

come home with a Silver Medal.**

**M**ikaela Foecke, a Junior this year at HTC and daughter of Brian and Kathleen Foecke, traveled this summer to Thailand to play volleyball with the USA Junior National Volleyball Team.

Foecke traveled to Colorado Springs last winter over Christmas break to play for 4 days at an initial Holiday tryout camp held at the Olympic Training Center. She then was asked to come back to Colorado Springs in early June, with 26 other High School girls ages 15 - 17 to continue the tryout process, at which time the field was cut to 16 players. Those 16 girls then traveled to Anaheim, CA in early July and practiced for 10 days as they competed for the 12 spots on the USA Junior National VB Team.

The USA Junior National Team then traveled from Anaheim to Korat, Thailand where they stayed for two weeks while competing in the biennial FIVB U18 World Volleyball Tournament. There were a total of 20 countries making up the playing field, with each team having qualified last year to come to the tournament. Team USA finished pool play ranked 1st in their pool, with only one loss, and then eventually went on to win a very tough semi-finals match against Brazil 3 - 2; giving Foecke and Team USA the opportunity to play China for the Gold Medal. This was the first time a team from the United States has ever gotten that far in this Tournament. However, the quicker Team China proved to be too much for the USA, with a middle hitter at 6'8" and several other players over 6'3". Team USA finished the tournament with six wins and two losses, winning the silver medal—the highest finish ever for a USA men's or women's

youth national team, and the only time a USA Team has ever medaled at this level.

Foecke played in 26 of the 27 sets played by Team USA, leading the USA Team in both serving and kills, and coming in second in total blocks. Foecke also came in second place in kill efficiency out of the entire tournament field of players, with the 6'8" player from China coming in first.

When asked about her trip to Thailand, Mikaela said; “It was a lot of fun and a great experience, all of the coaches and players were really great; and while I was glad to get back to the USA so I could eat a real hamburger, I also look forward to more opportunities like it in the future.”

Mikaela has verbally committed to play volleyball after high school for the Nebraska Cornhuskers, currently ranked fifth in the nation in women's volleyball. She intends to study Agriculture and Animal Science, and eventually would like to become a veterinarian. [HTC](#)


## Tyler James Reinhardt HTC Class of 2007
